Well, what a strange year this has been. Most of the projections I made in my report to last year's AGM have had to be put on hold due to the Covid virus. But all that means is they have been delayed rather than cancelled, and this year's programme, assuming the lifting of Covid-19 restrictions, should hopefully see their realisation.

We have continued as much activity as we could, including the publication of Newsletters and maintaining our website. But probably our biggest impact has been the publication of our 2021 calendar, the sales of which far exceeded our expectations and kept us afloat.

2020 was tinged with huge sadness when our Treasurer, Colin Price, lost his fight against cancer. His passing had a huge impact on all of us: Colin had a major part to play in the early years of establishing the History Club and was therefore part of our DNA.

We struggled to assimilate life without Colin, but moving forward, we are delighted that David Bayly has accepted the role of Treasurer to keep an eye on our finances.
